Ecclesiastes Review – Reflections on his long life ...



- Solomon wisest, richest, most powerful, most protected
- Frustrated, tried everything
- But <u>no satisfaction</u>, <u>no yitron</u>, and <u>no meaning</u> "under the sun"
- □ "<u>Hebel</u>"

Yet <u>on reflection</u> ... Life is God's gift to men



- □ Joy, peace and contentment come as direct gifts from God to men of faith – that is, to those who fear Him
- □ <u>Savor</u> life <u>in the moment</u> ... one apple at a time!

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." (Psalm 111:10)



The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

¹Guard your steps as you go to the house of God and draw near to listen rather than to offer the sacrifice of fools; for they do not know they are doing evil.

- LOOK AROUND. Solomon warns worshippers in the house of God the very <u>Temple that he built</u>
- □ "<u>Guard your steps</u>" Be reverent, sober, prepared
- □ Draw near to "listen" that is, to obey God's Word
 - God <u>will not tolerate</u> perfunctory, insincere worship
 - Offerings from <u>hands without obedient faith</u> become the "<u>sacrifice of fools</u>" because <u>only a fool thinks</u> he can <u>deceive God</u>
 - The fool thinks he can fool God, but he is only doing evil.

The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

²Do not be hasty in word or impulsive in thought to bring up a matter in the presence of God. For God is in heaven and you are on the earth; therefore, let your words be few.

- LOOK AROUND. A second warning: Prayer is a <u>serious</u> <u>undertaking</u>.
- It must be entered into soberly and in the fear of God.
 - If you were privileged to present your requests to the <u>White House</u>, you would certainly prepare quite carefully
 - How <u>much more care</u> should you give when you <u>come</u> to the throne of Almighty God?

God <u>rules from heaven</u> ... You are but a <u>finite</u>, <u>powerless</u>, <u>tiny</u>, <u>speck</u> on the earth



The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

³For the dream comes through much effort and the voice of a fool through many words.



- Just as a <u>dream is brought to reality</u> through <u>much</u> <u>hard work</u>
- The voice of a fool is revealed through many words
- If we pray lengthy and eloquent prayers only to impress people, we will not get through to God!
- John Bunyan wrote, "In prayer, it is <u>better to have a heart</u> without words, than words without a heart."

"God, be merciful to me, the sinner!" Luke 18:13





The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

⁴When you make a vow to God, do not be late in paying it; for He takes no delight in fools. Pay what you vow! ⁵It is better that you should not vow than that you should vow and not pay.

- LOOK AROUND. A third warning about <u>making vows or</u> promises to the Lord
- God does not require vows to be accepted by him. But if you are considering making a vow to God:
 - STOP ... if you are making the vow to impress others, or to "bribe" the Lord, and you have no unshakable commitment to keep the vow! That is a serious sin with serious consequences.
 - If you <u>do make that vow</u>, <u>keep it without delay</u>! Only a <u>fool</u> would delay, or not pay!





The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

⁶Do not let your speech cause you to sin and do not say in the presence of the messenger of God that it was a mistake. Why should God be angry on account of your voice and destroy the work of your hands?

LOOK AROUND. More on vows.

- The point here is you've made a vow and not kept it ... now you're digging your hole deeper and deeper
- Don't start making up excuses or lies. That would be foolish and a sin.
- <u>Confess</u>. Don't be Ananias and Sapphira (Acts 5)
- Seek forgiveness lest God destroy the work of your hands.
- He is not kidding around.





The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

⁷For in many dreams and in many words, there is emptiness. Rather, fear God.

LOOK AROUND. A warning about Empty Vows.

- Some people <u>make empty vows</u> because they <u>live in a</u> <u>religious "dream world"</u>.
- They think their words are the same as deeds.
- They enjoy "good feelings" when they make promises to God, and they dream about fulfilling those promises, but they never get around to doing them. "Hebel"

"FEAR God"

"Do not fear those who kill the body but are unable to kill the soul; but rather <u>fear Him</u> who is able to destroy both soul and body in hell." (MATT 10:28)

The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

⁷For in many dreams and in many words, there is emptiness. Rather, fear God.

- LOOK AROUND. Solomon establishes his dominant theme: "Fear God"
- □ The "Fear of God" is not an attitude of terror. It is:
 - A <u>commitment</u> of the <u>total being</u>
 - To trust, believe and obey the living God, and
 - To give God all <u>reverence</u>, <u>honor</u> and <u>glory</u>
 - As <u>Sovereign Lord</u>, who <u>reigns</u> over the <u>whole creation</u>
- Man must <u>FIRST</u> be a <u>believer and worshiper</u> if he is <u>ever</u> to <u>enjoy</u> <u>living</u> as <u>God created and intended</u> him to live.





The Monotony of Life (3:1 – 5:9)

⁸If you see oppression of the poor and denial of justice and righteousness in the province, do not be shocked at the sight; for one official watches over another official, and there are higher officials over them. ⁹After all, a king who cultivates the field is an advantage to the land.

- LOOK AROUND. Solomon once again looks at corrupt politicians oppressing the poor.
- Corruption should not be <u>shocking</u> much is "misplaced" in the bureaucracy.
- But, in spite of the corruption <u>an organized government</u> (king) is better than anarchy.
- Everyone benefits from organized authority, which can correct some of the abuses of man.

The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹⁰He who loves money will not be satisfied with money, nor he who loves abundance with its income. This too is vanity.

- EMPLOYING WEALTH. Here Solomon demolishes the myths people hold about wealth that prevent them from enjoying the blessings God has for them.
- Myth: Satisfaction. If I just had more money/stuff, I could finally be Satisfied
- "Satisfied" is Hebrew for "that's enough" or "I'm content"
- Phil 4:11, "I have learned to be content" shows being "content" is not natural
- He who loves money is insatiable ... his desire outruns his acquisitions. Meaningless ... empty ... "hebel"



The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹⁰He who loves money will not be satisfied with money, nor he who loves abundance with its income. This too is vanity.

EMPLOYING WEALTH.

"⁶Now there is <u>great gain in godliness</u> with <u>contentment</u>. ⁷For we <u>brought nothing into</u> the world, and we <u>cannot take</u> <u>anything out</u> of the world. ⁸But if we have food and clothing, with these <u>we will be content</u>.

⁹But <u>those who desire to be rich fall</u> into temptation, into a snare, into many <u>senseless and harmful desires</u> that plunge people into <u>ruin</u> and <u>destruction</u>. ¹⁰For the <u>love of money</u> is the <u>root</u> of all kinds of <u>evils</u>." (1 TIMOTHY 6:6-10)





The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹⁰He who loves money will not be satisfied with money, nor he who loves abundance with its income. This too is vanity.

EMPLOYING WEALTH.

- Not to be Conceited Money puffs up pride
- Uncertainty of Riches Fortunes can disappear in an instant
- Things to enjoy Money is only a means to enjoyment. If one loves only money ... he misses out on all the other things God wants him to enjoy





The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹¹When good things increase, those who consume them increase. So, what is the advantage to their owners except to look on?

- EMPLOYING WEALTH. Myth: Friends Wealth gives me Friends
- An increase in wealth creates an increase in claims on that wealth:
 - Staff to manage it
 - All sorts of <u>parasites</u>
- Everyone has a "need" ... including the tax man
- Watch all those people "eat your wealth"!
- <u>Can</u> you <u>know</u> who are your <u>real friends</u>?



The Futility of Wealth (5:10 – 6:12)

¹²The sleep of the working man is pleasant, whether he eats little or much; but the full stomach of the rich man does not allow him to sleep.

- EMPLOYING WEALTH. Myth: No Worries if I weere wealthy, all my stress and problems would disappear
- □ Solomon says <u>common laborer</u> enjoys <u>peaceful sleep</u>
- But wealth brings worry, sleeplessness, stress and the fear of loss
- Study on stress
 - <u>60%</u> of Doctor visits are <u>for stress</u>
 - Most <u>highly-prescribed</u> drugs are "<u>tranquilizers</u>"





The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹³There is a grievous evil which I have seen under the sun: <u>riches being hoarded</u> by their owner to his <u>hurt</u>. ¹⁴When those riches were lost through a bad investment, and he had fathered a son, then there was <u>nothing to support him</u>.

- EMPLOYING WEALTH. Myth: <u>Security</u> My wealth will keep me secure.
- <u>Cannot</u> rely on <u>money</u> Security is only in the Lord
- Hoarding offers no protection
- Risking all on one investment offers no protection
- The money one makes and keeps is completely under God's control
- A grievous evil ... "hebel"





The Futility of Wealth (5:10 – 6:12)

¹⁵As he had <u>come naked</u> from his mother's womb, <u>so will he return</u> as he came. He will <u>take</u> <u>nothing</u> from the fruit of his labor that he can carry in his hand. ¹⁶This also is a grievous evil, exactly as a man is born, thus will he die. So, what is the advantage to him who toils for the wind?

- EMPLOYING WEALTH. Myth: <u>Security</u> My wealth will keep me secure.
- The wealthy man <u>returns</u> to his maker <u>devoid</u> of all his <u>riches</u>
- Nevertheless, men spend all their days in distressing labor, great risk and stress just getting money
- They <u>inevitably</u> lose it <u>ALL</u>
- An <u>empty goal</u> ... no advantage ... "<u>hebel</u>"

The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹⁷Throughout his life he also eats in darkness with great vexation, sickness and anger.

- EMPLOYING WEALTH. Solomon summarizes the results from those four myths about wealth:
 - Satisfaction ... Vexation because not enough
 - Friends ... Angry at those consuming
 - No Worries ... Sickness from stress
 - Security ... In darkness and fear
- □ Wealth ... in itself ... won't bring satisfaction
- □ So ... how can one find satisfaction?





The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

¹⁸Here is what I have seen to be good and fitting: to eat, to drink and enjoy oneself in all one's labor in which he toils under the sun during the few years of his life which God has given him; for this is his reward.

ENJOYING WEALTH. How can one find satisfaction?

- Solomon gives <u>God's perfect plan</u> for <u>life "under the</u> <u>sun</u>"
- It is "good" and "fitting" "to eat, to drink," which can only be enjoyed in the moment – one apple at a time
- And "<u>enjoy oneself in all one's labor</u>" ... which in Hebrew means to "<u>see the good</u>"

During the "few years of life" – so don't waste time





The Futility of Wealth (5:10 – 6:12)

¹⁹Furthermore, as for every man to whom God has given riches and wealth, He has also empowered him to eat from them and to receive his reward and rejoice in his labor; this is the gift of God.

ENJOYING WEALTH. How does one "see the good"?

- The <u>capacity</u> to see the good is a gift from God given to men of faith – those who fear Him (believers)
- God does not promise to give the best things to believers

God gives believers:

Chapter 5

The <u>gift to completely enjoy</u> <u>whatever</u> they <u>receive</u> from God (their apple)

The gift to <u>gratefully give thanks</u> to God in <u>every</u> <u>circumstance</u> (*1 Thess 5:16-18*)



The Futility of Wealth (5:10 - 6:12)

²⁰For he will not often consider the years of his life, because God keeps him occupied with the gladness of his heart.

- The one who <u>fears God</u> (believer) <u>fears nothing else</u> ... <u>not even death</u>
- He <u>delights</u> in this very <u>moment</u> ... this very <u>day</u> ... the <u>apple</u> before him
- He has <u>no time</u> to be concerned with death
- And when death comes ... this life has been so satisfying that he is ready to go home to the Lord
